Invested in FOP Support Activities Dear FOP Australia and New Zealand Community and our worldwide supporters,

The 2020/21 year has seen the continuation of the global pandemic COVID-19. As always, I hope everyone has been able to stay safe during these times.

We have continued to partner with IFOPA on events such as the community gathering in November 2020, which saw people from around the globe meet virtually and hear from a range of FOP experts and others from within our community. FOP Awareness Day held in April each year included a social media campaign during April to raise awareness of FOP, once again this campaign was a success and planning for 2022 will start soon.

Although the ability to hold some fundraising events in person has been impacted by COVID-19, the community raised \$68K during the 20/21 period. We saw a wide range of events over this time, half marathons, collection of old car batteries, AFL footy tipping competition, Facebook birthday fundraisers, bike rides, coffee club subscriptions, entertainment book purchases, stair climbs, birthday scuba dives and corporate donations to name just a few.

This has given FOP Australia the ability to donate the following amounts to further research into FOP. \$5K to Shore Lab at the University of Pennsylvania, \$14K to IFOPA's In Pursuit of a Cure – Gene Therapy Program and \$14K to drug development activities coordinated by IFOPA.



Our ability to make such generous donations would not be possible without the support of our community so thank you.

An Australia and New Zealand gathering of our FOP community remains a key priority when we are able to do so, we have allocated \$17K to ensure that when the time comes, we are ready to support this initiative.

A further \$17K has been allocated for support activities such as our Support Grant Program. This program has helped many people living with FOP with day-to-day activities. So far, we have providing funding for items such as ramps for the home, a laptop and mobile phone and an adjustable bed. I encourage everyone to visit the support grant page on our website to learn more and reach out if you have any questions.



It would not be possible to reflect on the past year without mentioning the sad loss of one of our own in April 2021.

Ollie Collins and his family have provided much support to everyone, not only in our community but globally. Ollie's diagnosis at a young age, propelled the Collins family into the community and they have been a strong presence since. A loss of someone within the community is always difficult, the loss of Ollie for me, was extremely difficult as he has been a constant provider of support to myself and many

within our small community. The outpouring of support and donations from not only in Australia but globally was humbling. Whilst I am grateful for the many donations that have come to FOP Australia in memory of Ollie, I wish the circumstances were much happier and he could be here to celebrate with us, most likely in a fancy pair of shoes and a velvet jacket.

Ollie was a strong disability advocate and champion for FOP Awareness. His words on social media resonated with many people around the world and within our small community. In the words of Ollie "Whoever you are, and however you move through life – walking, rolling, running, limping, dancing whatever – always move to the beat of your own drum".



Thank you to Ollie and the Collins family for the work you have done for our community over many years, and to me personally during this journey. It is very difficult to put into words the gratitude I have, so please know we are thinking of you.

After much reflection, I made the tough decision to step down as Chair and the Board of FOP Australia. I initially became involved with FOP Australia when Julie Collins approached me before the formation of our Charity. My time has been rewarding, challenging and I have enjoyed working with our community as we move closer to finding a cure for FOP. I could not have gone this far without the support of the community in Australia, New Zealand and Globally, the IFOPA, FOP Australia founding board members, past board members and the current board.

I wish the current board all the best as they move towards new leadership of FOP Australia and I'm excited to see what is to come. I continue to remain in my current role as the local representative on the IFOPA International President's Council, which helps keep FOP families connected and informed about treatments and research. #### **Our Mission**

*Our mission is to raise awareness of Fibrodysplasia Ossificans Progressiva (FOP), and to provide a support network for those individuals and families affected by FOP and establish and fund research towards treatment and a cure for FOP.* 

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#### **Overview of FOP Australia**

FOP Australia was established in 2015, with the first Annual General Meeting held in Brisbane in May that year. Through links with the International FOP Association (IFOPA), we aim to improve the lives of individuals and families affected by FOP by:

- Raising awareness of FOP
- Providing a support network for families and individuals with FOP
- Furthering research towards treatment and a cure

With the FOP research effort entering the clinical trial phase, in late 2018 the board mapped out an <u>Advocacy</u> <u>Strategy</u> for the charity to guide future strategic planning. You can read more about the development of the strategy <u>here</u>.

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#### History & Structure

FOP Australia was established in 2015, by those affected by FOP, whether they were a patient, family member or friend. The first Annual General Meeting was held in Brisbane in May that year. FOP Australia is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-forprofits Commission (ACNC) as a charity with Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status through the Australian Tax Office. This organisation is a company limited by guarantee; we have a board of directors and are accountable to our members. We have no paid employees and run purely through volunteers.

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## TREASURERS REPORT

I would like to thank our members and the rest of the board for again entrusting me with the role of treasurer for FOP Australia. It has been a fantastic experience to work with our small team and be a part of each of the achievements throughout the year. I am very pleased to be able to present this report on our 2020/2021 financial circumstances.

I hereby submit to members a statement of the accounts of FOP Australia, namely the financial statements of FOP Australia for the year ended 30th June 2021, and the auditor's report dated 24th November 2021, including:

- Income and Expenditure during the last financial year; and
- Assets and Liabilities in the last financial year;

#### Key Highlights

Key highlights from a financial perspective this year, include:

- FY21 profit of \$39,087
- Cash on hand at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2021 is \$106,734
- \$29,381 from the funds raised in FY21 will be donated towards projects supported by IFOPA
- \$5,000 from the funds raised in FY21 will be donated to Shore Lab at the University of Pennsylvania
- \$17,190 from the funds raised in FY21 will be allocated for support activities
- \$17,190 from the funds raised in FY21 will be allocated for our future patient gathering

The 2020-2021 Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Profit and Loss and Statement of Cash Flows are attached. This shows the years profit at \$39,087 for FOP Australia for the 2020/2021 financial year.

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As at 30th June 2021 FOP Australia had equity of \$106,734. The fundraising efforts of FOP Australia and its members in FY21 will allow us to contribute \$5,000 to the Shore Lab at the University of Pennsylvania, and a total of \$29,381 towards projects supported by IFOPA. The remainder of our fundraising efforts from this year will be allocated to support activities (\$17,190) and our future patient gathering (\$17,190). While we have been affected by the continual restrictions of the Covid 19 pandemic in our ability to run face to face fundraisers, it is pleasing to see that we have maintained the support of our regular donors as well as been able to carry out some great online fundraising events.


FOP Australia continues to be in a stable financial position and well placed to further grow our fundraising capacity to address our financial commitments, now and in the future. We are eager to introduce new and exciting projects to best utilise these funds and further support the FOP community, as well as continue to provide the current support structures that we have in place.

FOP Australia's main sources of income remain to be pod fundraisers and individual donations. It has been pleasing to see our base of supporters grow and carry out fundraisers in their own unique ways. We are always grateful for each person's efforts and not only the fundraising aspect but also the contribution to raising awareness that comes with each event.

Expenses have been kept to an absolute minimum, rising slightly from last year as we grow our online reach. These are expected to remain stable during the 2021-2022 financial year, with no considerable differences being foreseen. Growing our fundraising base, implementing, and continuing work towards regular contributions and introducing new and engaging fundraising ideas will cement future growth for FOP Australia and allow us to continue to assist those within the FOP community.

Thank you all for your support and I look forward to continuing my incredibly privileged work within the new role of Chair at FOP Australia. It will be exciting to share our future successes with you all.

The website and flyers remain our main information materials to share. The plan to obtain more FOP Australia flyers for distribution has begun. Presentation notes have not been finalised, and this action is to be carried over to the subsequent year.

- We remain a member of the Rare Voices Australia network and receive updates regarding their work on Rare Disease Advocacy. RVA helped share online information for FOP Awareness Day. The FOP Australia Chair attended the virtual RVA Parliamentary event, engaging federal politicians with rare disease advocacy.
- Federal Minister for Health Greg Hunt was directly approached with a request to assist with promoting FOP Awareness Day, though this did not go ahead. Minister Hunt provided a letter of support for the Footy Day fundraiser (though that event had to be postponed due to COVID restrictions).

A total of \$34,381(50% of the funds raised during 2020/21) will be donated towards furthering the global research effort. This met the predetermined KPI, and the maximum threshold of funds that can be sent overseas according to regulatory requirements.

A total of \$68,762 was raised in the 2020/21 financial year. In a difficult fundraising climate, the funds donated to FOP Australia increased from \$25,000 in the previous financial year.

To ensure maximum impact from your donations and fundraising work, the board decided to distribute this across a range of research initiatives.

• \$5000 of funds raised has been allocated to the Shore Lab at the University of Pennsylvania, whose work in understanding the basis of FOP (including the previous discovery of the FOP



gene mutation, and their ongoing work to understand how the disease works) underpins the ongoing global research effort to find a cure.

- \$14,690.50 will be donated to the research in to gene therapy via IFOPA's 'In Pursuit of a Cure' campaign
- \$14,690.50 will be donated to the International FOP Association to support other research projects focussing on furthering progress for potential treatments.

We look forward to providing our community with updates from these projects over coming years.

No grant funds were received during this period.

Several fundraisers have been set up by individuals and families that have not previously run activities and are not on the board, suggesting positive progress in enabling more broad community input in to fundraising. These fundraisers have utilised Facebook's fundraising function, Grassrootz, mycause and the GiveNow Crowdraiser options. Notes on operating fundraisers have also been added to the board's operational handbook. A fundraising group has been established and has met,


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though more members and input would be warmly welcomed. A page on how to run a fundraiser has been included in the website and promoted on social media and in our newsletter. An additional fundraising platform (Grassrootz) was added to our existing platforms.

The end of the financial year including preparing a grant submission for a highly competitive federal grant program, the Rare Disease Support Education and Training Grant Opportunity. The process of drafting the application provided an opportunity for board directors to learn more about the process, and to prepare content that can also be used for future grant applications.

The board remain keen to develop processes to better recognise contributions to the charity, in order to ensure donors know how very appreciated they are, and to understand how the donated funds are utilised. Thank you certificates have been sent to acknowledge the non-financial contributions of several volunteers during the year, but this process could be made more consistent.

This has provided an opportunity to monitor for any potential local engagement in trials. These included giving feedback from our community regarding the Burden of Illness project, which did not include people in Australia and New Zealand.

FOP Australia was approached by a third-party company ascertaining information about numbers of patients within Australia and New Zealand for an unidentified pharmaceutical company to run a clinical



trial in the future. This information was provided but there was no further progress by the end of the financial year.

Membership of the IFOPA research committee has been maintained.

A board representative met with new IFOPA Research Director Danielle Kerkovich to ensure that the needs and challenges of people with FOP in Australia and New Zealand are understood and are considered as part of future research activities. This included discussion that the Australian and New Zealand community members want to have opportunities to be included in future trials or other opportunities to further the global research effort.

Participation in the registry has been promoted within FOP Australia newsletters and online.

Regarding further support activities:

- Three \$1000 support grants were awarded during this period, facilitated by a volunteer returning officer and an independent selection panel of volunteer experts.
- A supply of extended flexible straws were obtained and distributed to people with FOP who expressed interest in these.
- Peer advice regarding access support via the NDIS has been drafted by volunteers including support worker, parent and person with FOP perspectives. This will be shared via the website.



• Private Facebook group for FOP Australia Patients and Families has continued to give opportunities for people to seek and provide peer support and advice.

Most pages of the website were updated, though at the end of the financial year some updates were still in progress (specifically content providing peer advice regarding seeking support via the NDIS was in draft form at that time).

In order to maximise opportunities for FOP awareness and engagement amongst the broader community, we have broadened distribution of our newsletter to all subscribers, rather than limiting it to those who pay to be members each year. Membership enables supporters to have a vote at the AGM and to nominate for the board, and as such provides opportunities for those who wish to guide the development and direction of the charity

Four member newsletters were emailed throughout the year. Website posts were added in all months except October, May and June.

Policies and procedures were finalised and uploaded to the website. Board directors contributed content to ongoing development of an operational handbook, for continual updating over time

In the context of limited local member and volunteer capacity, progress has not been made towards seeking registered charity status in New Zealand. However, we have maintained contact with people with FOP in New Zealand, including provision of a support grant to a resident of New Zealand. We will continue to include people with FOP and their families and supporters from New Zealand in the activities of our organisation.



### MEDICAL REPORT

The last year has seen development in resources available to clinicians treating people with FOP:

- The International Clinical Council for FOP released an updated version of 'The Medical Management of Fibrodysplasia Ossificans Progressiva: Current Treatment Considerations" in April 2021. This is the main document used by treating clinicians around the world and is accessible by a link at the top of every page of the FOP Australia website (fopaustralia.org). We encourage all people with FOP to make sure their treating clinicians know how to access this.
- Travel restrictions in recent years have seen many medical conferences move online and an expansion in the range of clinical resources available online. Clinicians managing patients with FOP now have a range of online resources to access, as listed at <u>https://www.ifopa.org/fop\_medical\_education\_programs</u>.
- FOP Australia share information about resources and key updates with our clinician database by email. Please encourage your treating doctors and multi-disciplinary care team to join by emailing <u>info@fopaustralia.org</u>.

The global research effort continues to evolve and expand, with pharmaceutical companies Ipsen and Regeneron continuing their FOP clinical trial programs throughout the 2020/2021 financial year. Announcements from both companies continue to be shared through the IFOPA and FOP Australia social media platforms to keep you up to date on the latest developments. FOP Australia remain in contact with pharmaceutical industry representatives directly and through the IFOPA to monitor for opportunities for local clinical trial involvement.

The international patient registry remains on the most important research projects. The patient data from this registry provides the basis for understanding FOP, and being able to



interpret current and future research projects studying potential treatments, Thank you to everyone who has contributed data to the FOP registry, Find out more at: <u>https://www.ifopa.org/fop\_registry\_hcp</u>

Thank you to members for taking the time to read our FY21 Annual Report and send feedback to help us ensure our communications to members about our activities are as clear as possible. Your feedback is important and appreciated to the Board, as we take our responsibility to people with FOP and to FOP Australia supporters very seriously. As a result of feedback, we have made the following edits in order to clarify several parts of this report:

- Page 7: Correcting the Board of Directors to include all directors. Due to human error, the initial version inadvertently did not include Brooke Scott in this section. We apologise to Brooke for this mistake.
- Page 8: We have amended the text to clarify where references are made to how the amounts raised in the 2020/2021 financial year will be allocated. #### Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

FOP Australia Ltd is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The company is registered with The Australian Charities and Not for Profits Commission and holds Deductible Gift Recipient Status.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 24 November 2021 by the directors of the company.

#### **Basis of Preparation**

The directors have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the company is a nonreporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. The financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the Collections Act 1966.

The company is a not for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Act 2012 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for cash flow information have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. The material accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

#### **Accounting Policies**

#### (a) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand deposits held at call with banks, other shortterm highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings incurrent liabilities on the statement of financial position.

#### (b) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Revenue recognition relating to the provision of services is determined with reference to the stage of completion of the transaction at the end of the reporting period and where the outcome of the contract can be estimated reliably. Stage of completion is determined with reference to the services performed to date as a percentage of total anticipated services to be performed. Where the outcome cannot be estimated reliably, revenue is recognised only to the extent that related expenditure is recoverable.

#### Qualified opinion

We have audited the financial report of FOP Australia Ltd (the Entity), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2021, the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial report, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the directors' declaration.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis for qualified opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Entity as at 30 June 2021 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

#### Basis for qualified opinion

Cash donations and cash collected at fundraising events is a significant source of revenue for FOP Australia Limited. FOP Australia Limited has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of cash donations and other cash collections at fund raising events prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding fundraising revenue from these sources was limited, our audit procedures with respect to cash donations and cash collected at fundraising events had to be restricted to amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion whether cash donations and cash collected at fundraising events is complete.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the Entity in accordance with ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

#### Emphasis of matter - Basis of accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the Entity to meet the requirements of the Collections Act 1966. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

#### Other information

The directors are responsible for the other information. The other information obtained at the date of this auditor's report is the directors' report.



Our opinion on the financial report does not cover the other information and accordingly we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial report, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial report or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.
